0:03 What is a conflict of interest?
0:06 Sometimes a service provider or support worker might have a conflict of interest.
0:13 This means they might not be able to make a choice that is fair for you.
0:18 Sam works at a disability service.
0:20 Sam is helping you pick a support worker.
0:23 One of the support workers is Sam's friend.
0:28 Sam and her friends leave together.
0:32 This could be a problem.
0:35 Sam might find it hard to be fair because they leave together.
0:40 Sam told her manager straight away.
0:43 She did not help choose the support worker.
0:47 Another key worker helps you instead.
0:50 This made the decision fair for you.
0:53 You can speak up if you think someone is helping a friend or family member, getting money or a gift

1:03 You can talk to another key worker, a team leader or manager, a family member or support person, a advocate who is someone who helps you speak up.
1:14 You can say I think there is a conflict of interest.
1:19 I don't feel like this is fair.
1:22 Can another key worker help me choose?
1:26 Hi, my name is Bri.
1:28 Thank you Ally for joining us today.
1:31 We just heard a story about Sam and conflict of interest.
1:36 Can you tell us what that means in real life?
1:41 Hi, Bri.
1:41 Thanks for having me.
1:42 A conflict of interest is when someone's personal life could get in the way of making a fair choice at work.
1:51 Like in the story, Sam's friend was one of the support workers, and they lived together.
1:57 Yeah, that could make things tricky.
2:00 Why is that a problem?

2:02 Because Sam might choose her friend, even if she doesn't mean to.
2:06 Her friend might not be the best person for you.
2:11 That's not fair for the person getting support.
2:14 But did Sam do the right thing?
2:17 Yes.
2:17 She told her manager straight away and she stepped back so someone else could help make the choice.
2:27 That means it was fair for the person who needed support.
2:32 So what should someone do?
2:34 If they think service provider or worker is helping a friend or making unfair choices?
2:44 They can speak up.
2:46 You can say this feels unfair or I think this is a conflict of interest.
2:54 You can ask for someone else to help, and who can you talk to?
3:00 You can talk to another key worker, A-Team leader or manager, another trusted person in your support network, or an advocate.
3:12 The main thing is, if you don't feel safe, you have the right to say something.
