About the Project



We spoke with people with intellectual disability, families, and everyone involved across Queensland.



We had meetings in Townsville, Toowoomba, Gold Coast, **Brisbane North** & South, and received 118 online surveys.



Our goal was to understand what works well and what is needed.



What People Said



Feeling Safe & Included

- Many people feel welcome in their community.
- But safety concerns in public transport, restaurants, and shops.
- Families are less confident in community inclusion.



Respect & Services

- People generally feel respected by health and disability services.
- But there are gaps in employment, school, and NDIS.
- Families see lower levels of respect and inclusion.



Access to Services

- Most people with disability agree that services are easy to use.
- Most families and carers do not agree that services are easy to use.



Barriers

Lack of awareness, high costs, poor information, limited opportunities.



Top Priorities



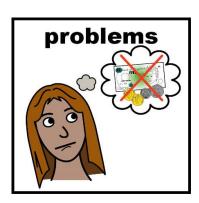
People with Intellectual Disability

- 2. Making friends
- 3. Being included and respected



Families & Carers

- 1. Inclusion and respect
- 2. Friendships
- 3. Access to quality healthcare



Main Challenges

- Not enough simple to read information
- Poor communication and system complexity (NDIS, health, education)
- Unfair ideas about people and exclusion
- Limited transport
- Limited opportunities in regional areas
- Not enough money

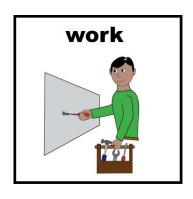


Community Solutions



Education & Training

- More post-school and life-skills programs
- · Self-advocacy training
- Disability awareness for teachers and providers



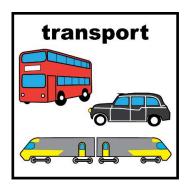
Employment

- Support for finding and keeping jobs
- Employer education
- A rule that helps make sure people with disabilities get some of the jobs.



Social Connection

- Inclusive events and sports
- Peer support groups for individuals and families



Transport

- Train transport staff
- Expand travel programs and parking concessions



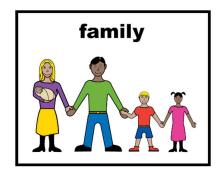
Communication

- Create **Easy Read** resources
- Build a one-stop information hub
- Ensure co-design includes lived experience



Voices from the Queensland All Abilities Network (QAAN)

- Help people make friends in their community
- · Keep disability funding secure
- Train support workers
- Support people to do what they love
- Allow people with disability to make their own decisions



What Families Told Us

- People often talk about rather than to those with disability
- Systems are confusing families want navigators
- Those with high support needs are often excluded
- "Remember, not everyone is on social media"





- Put lived experience at the centre of decisions
- Strengthen regional support
- Offer more inclusive social and family opportunities
- Provide **clear information** in an easy-to-understand format
- Keep listening through regular community consultations





People with intellectual disabilities want:

- To belong, feel safe, and be respected
- Equal chances in education, jobs, and community life
- Systems that are simple, fair, and inclusive

Together, we can build a Queensland where everyone is valued and supported to thrive.
